

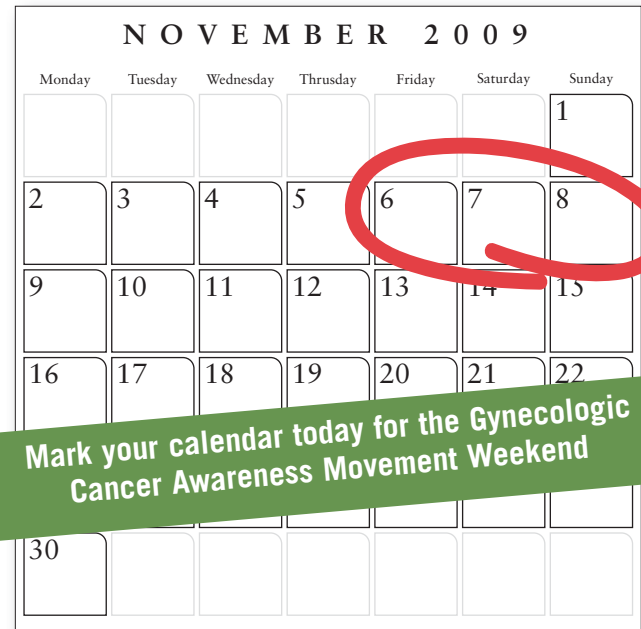

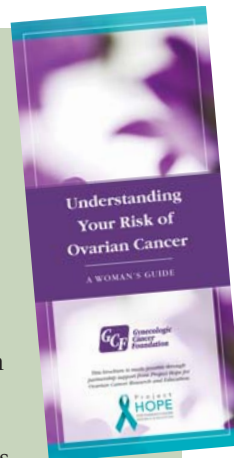
Project Hope for Ovarian Cancer Research and Education

Hope Perry Goldstein died September 14, 2004, after a long and courageous battle with ovarian cancer. During her illness, she asked her husband Alfred G. Goldstein to work to prevent other women from having to endure this illness

Mr. Goldstein, and their two sons, Mark and Robert, honored her request through the formation of Project Hope for Ovarian Cancer Research and Education. *Understanding Your Risk for Ovarian Cancer: A Woman's Guide* was developed by Project Hope, physicians and medical specialists at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center and New York University Cancer Institute, and GCF.

A former president of Sears Roebuck and Co. Specialty Merchandising and Primerica, Mr. Goldstein applied a traditional business strategic planning process to the problem of ovarian cancer. The plan, developed by the doctors and medical professionals using his process, clearly delineates the mission, strategies and goals of Project Hope, and involves a communications program and an ovarian cancer research project. Doctors vigorously embraced this new approach that has yielded positive and measurable results.

GCF thanks Mr. Goldstein and the medical professionals who have made strides in defining ovarian cancer, its symptoms, individual risks and appropriate risk-reducing measures. ■



Understanding Your Risks of Ovarian Cancer: A Woman's Guide

The Gynecologic Cancer Foundation is pleased to offer a new brochure that extends its efforts to reach all women in America, not just those diagnosed with a gynecologic cancer.

Understanding Your Risk of Ovarian Cancer: A Woman's Guide outlines the symptoms of ovarian cancer, a woman's individual level of risk and the appropriate risk-reducing measures for each level of risk.

While the risk of ovarian cancer increases with age, especially around the time of menopause, all women are at risk for ovarian cancer. Some may have a personal or family history that

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may further substantially increase that risk from up to one in 70 life-time risk in the general population to up to 1 in 2 at the highest risk level.

“This is an invaluable brochure, especially for women like me, who have been haunted by familial cancer for years,” said Ann Kolker, a 13-year ovarian cancer survivor. “It gives our family decision-making tools that I wish I had known about before I was diagnosed with ovarian cancer.”

GCF Hires Bi-lingual Health Education Trainer

As part of GCF’s expanding outreach to the medically underserved, especially Hispanic women, Cherie is presenting low literacy Spanish language educational sessions on cervical cancer in Chicago. She

also is developing and testing a Train-the-Trainer curriculum for disseminating cervical cancer prevention information to lay health educators in both English and Spanish. She has assisted GCF in expanding its extensive cervical cancer education Web site content into Spanish.

Ms. Estrada comes to GCF with 10 years of experience at the Illinois Department of Public Health in training and health promotion in both Spanish and English.

“I admire GCF for its efforts to reach underserved women, especially Hispanic women,” said Ms. Estrada. “I have seen the positive changes that health education can have upon an individual, and oftentimes, an entire family. It is so fulfilling to join the GCF team, and use my training and language skills to bring important information about cervical and other gynecologic cancers to women whose first language is Spanish.”

Cherie will help GCF meet its goal of reaching the underserved population who are at greater risk for advanced-stage gynecologic cancers. ■



GCF Funded Research Makes News

Twice in the last three months research funded by GCF has made

news because of the importance of the findings.

Most recently, a GCF research grant given to Dr. Mark H. Einstein in 2005 led to the publication of findings that link genetics with the risk of developing cervical cancer. He, along with Dr. Robert D. Burk, also from Albert Einstein College of Medicine of Yeshiva University, led a study that found that women with certain gene variations appear to be protective against cervical cancer.

The study, published in the February edition of *Clinical Cancer Research*, presented evidence that suggests that some women are better able than others to suppress the consequences from infection with the Human Papillomavirus (HPV), the cause of almost all cervical cancer. This improved protection can most likely be traced to variations in the genes that influence the body's immune response.

Two groups of women were studied: women with a high-grade cervical intraepithelial neoplasm (CIN), a pre-malignancy caused by an infection with cancer-causing HPV types; and women who tested positive for HPV but had not developed high-grade CIN.

Looking at a gene called TAP, known to be central to the immune system's

ability to recognize viruses and eliminate them, Dr. Einstein and his colleagues found that in the 480 women studied, the key difference between the two groups was the location at two points of their TAP genes. This knowledge offers researchers with yet another opportunity to develop strategies to protect against cervical cancer.

"These findings take us one step closer to being able to develop a genetic test that allows us to determine which patients with an on-going HPV infection go on to develop cancer and which women's immune system can effectively fight the virus," said Dr. Einstein.

Dr. Einstein and his colleagues also see these results as an opportunity to advance efforts to tailor care to the individual, referred to as personalized medicine.

Cervical cancer is completely preventable, yet almost 4,000 women in the United States die from this cancer each year. ■



Multiple GCF Research Awards Contribute to Understanding of Proteins Linked to Likelihood of Survival in Ovarian Cancer Patients

A study published December 18, 2008, in the *New England Journal of Medicine* describes how the levels of two proteins are linked to the likelihood of survival in women diagnosed with ovarian cancer. A similar association is found in both lung and breast cancers.

"Dicer, Drosha, and Outcome in Patients with Ovarian Cancer," authored by a research team from The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, discusses the impact of the levels of two proteins, Dicer and Drosha, that are key to a cell's gene-silencing machinery, on median survival for ovarian cancer patients. Patients with high levels of Dicer and Drosha had a median survival of 11 years compared to women with low levels of either or both proteins, whose median survival was 2.66 years.

The Gynecologic Cancer Foundation (GCF) provided some of the initial funding for the science that led to this observation and its impact on potential RNA interference (RNAi)-based therapeutics. In 2005, Dr. Robert L. Coleman, one of the study's authors, was awarded the GCF/Florence & Marshall Schwid Ovarian Cancer Award for his study, "Therapeutic Gene Silencing with siRNA in Ovarian Carcinoma" which studied the clinical relevance of these proteins in ovarian cancer patients, as well as their role in RNAi-based gene silencing. The first author of the study published, Dr. William M. Merritt, mentored by Dr. Anil Sood, the paper's senior author, received the GCF/Carol's Cause Award for the outstanding paper by a resident or fellow at the 2007 Society of Gynecologic Oncologists Annual Meeting on Women's Cancer.

"We hope, as a result of this new knowledge, to be able to utilize the levels of these two proteins to guide treatment decisions and, eventually, to create a delivery mechanism that permits RNA interference to attack tumors directly," Dr. Coleman stated.

Mike Burg Named 2008 GCF Public Service Award Recipient

Mike Burg was awarded the 2008 Public Service Award on February 5, 2009, in San Antonio, TX, at the 40th Annual Meeting of the Society of Gynecologic Oncologists. Since 1997, GCF has honored individuals or groups of individuals who directly impact gynecologic cancer awareness with this award.

Mike's 2001 diagnosis of Hodgkin's disease motivated him to turn his talents, developed during an award-winning career in sports television and marketing, to making the world cancer-free.

He directed his firm, Edge Marketing & Management, Inc. a Charlotte,

North Carolina-based entertainment, sports marketing and production enterprise, to create a television sports venue that would raise awareness about cancers that affect women. GCF is one of the four not-for-profit organizations invited to be part of this far-reaching awareness effort.

In 2007, he produced *Frosted Pink*, Putting Women's Cancer on Ice, that showcased leading ice skaters. In 2008, a similar production, *Frosted Pink with a Twist* featuring Olympic gymnasts, also aired on ABC television. Hollywood personalities and recording artists appeared on both those shows.

"It is a great honor to receive this award," said Mike Burg. "It also is a humbling experience to be recognized in this way by an organization whose members care for women with life-threatening cancers each and every day. I hope that our awareness efforts will help reduce the burden of these cancers," he continued.

Thanks to Mr. Burg's efforts, GCF has reached an audience of over 13 million viewers and garnered over 100 million total media impressions. GCF also has received over \$35,000 to date from *Frosted Pink*. Plans are underway for *Frosted Pink 2009*. ■

OCRF Symptoms Study with the GCF

The Ovarian Cancer Research Fund Symptoms Study, offered for the first time, builds on an original symptoms study conducted by Dr. Goff which formed the basis for the first national Consensus Statement on Ovarian Cancer Symptoms, issued in 2007. The grant will allow Dr. Goff and her team to further pursue their efforts to develop a systematic symptoms screening process for ovarian cancer.

GCF congratulates all the research grants and award recipients, and thanks the members of the GCF Awards Committee, chaired by Dr. Thomas Herzog, for their efforts. ■

The GCF Research Grant Model: The Margaret A. Greenfield/Carmel Cohen, MD Excellence in Ovarian Cancer Research Prize

GCF's gives priority to young investigators in its research grants program and often the GCF award is the first major research grant in a young researcher's career.

First awarded in 2005, the Margaret Greenfield/Carmel Cohen, MD Excellence in Ovarian Cancer Research Prize is presented annually to the individual who can best demonstrate that he or she has been able to use the GCF award to improve women's health care. Those who apply for the prize must demonstrate how the initial award given by GCF has resulted in continued meritorious research.

This prize illustrates the ingredients of GCF successful research program. It combines the love of a family for a woman who lost her battle to a gynecologic cancer with the passion of her doctor, resulting in major research accomplishments.

Mr. James Greenfield gives this prize in memory of his wife, Margaret,

who died from ovarian cancer. Dr. Carmel Cohen was her physician and friend, and continues today as a great friend of Mr. Greenfield's. Upon his wife's death, Mr. Greenfield turned to Dr. Cohen for guidance about how best to honor her memory. The Margaret Greenfield/Carmel Cohen, MD Excellence in Ovarian Cancer Research Prize is the result.

This year's prize recipient, Dr. Ronald Alvarez, received the Kea Simon Ovarian Cancer Award in 2004. Since the original award, which allowed him to develop pilot data on novel gene therapeutics, he has continued his research exploring the clinical application of gene therapy with major support from the National Cancer Institute and others.

"I am confident that with continued perseverance and dedication to the scientific process of investigation that it will be only a matter of time before our ovarian and other gynecologic cancer patients will have new and

effective gene and cellular based therapies at their disposal," said Dr. Alvarez in accepting the prize.

GCF offers heartfelt thanks to Mr. Greenfield and Dr. Cohen, and 12 other families who have funded on-going memorial research grants that hold a similar promise of earlier diagnosis and improved therapies for women diagnosed with a gynecologic cancer. ■
